



Antigua and Barbuda off the EU blacklist

11 October 2024 - The European Union (EU) has removed Antigua and Barbuda from its list of non-cooperative jurisdictions for tax purposes.

The EU Council revised its list of non-cooperative jurisdictions for tax purposes on 8 October 2024. The next revision of the list is scheduled for February 2025.

With the removal of the sovereign island country in the Caribbean, the EU list now consists of 11 jurisdictions including Russia, which remains on the list from 14 February 2023.

Any dividend, interest and royalty payments made/accrued to corporate taxpayers located in such jurisdictions by a Cyprus tax resident payer are subject to 17%, 17% and 10% withholding tax, respectively. Also, any interest and royalty payments may also be subject to DAC 6 reporting obligations.

This revised EU list of non-cooperative tax jurisdictions (Annex I) includes countries that have either not engaged in a constructive dialogue with the EU on tax governance or have failed to deliver on their commitments to implement the necessary reforms. Those reforms should aim to comply with a set of objective tax good governance criteria, which include tax transparency, fair taxation and implementation of international standards designed to prevent tax base erosion and profit shifting.
